Exodus 20:1-17

20 Then God spoke all these words:

<sup>2</sup> I am the Lord your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery; <sup>3</sup> you shall have no other gods before me. <sup>4</sup> You shall not make for yourself an idol, whether in the form of anything that is in heaven above, or that is on the earth beneath, or

that is in the water under the earth. <sup>5</sup> You shall not bow down to them or worship them; for I the Lord your God am a jealous God, punishing

children for the iniquity of parents, to the third and the fourth generation of those who reject me, <sup>6</sup> but showing steadfast love to the thousandth generation of those who love me and keep my commandments.

#### John 2:13-22

The Passover of the Jews was near, and Jesus went up to Jerusalem. In the temple he found people selling cattle, sheep, and doves, and the money-changers seated at their tables. In Making a whip of cords, he drove all of them out of the temple, both the sheep and the cattle. He also poured out the coins of the money-changers and overturned their tables. In He told those who were selling the doves, 'Take these things out of here! Stop making my Father's house a market-place!' His disciples remembered that it was written, 'Zeal for your house will consume me.' In The Jews then said to him, 'What sign can you show us for doing this?' In Jesus answered them, 'Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up.' The Jews then said, 'This temple

has been under construction for forty-six years, and will you raise it up in three days?" <sup>21</sup> But he was speaking of the temple of his body.

<sup>22</sup> After he was raised from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this; and they believed the scripture and the word that Jesus had spoken.

# Reflection by Rev Chris Westgarth

So what's actually going on in our gospel reading...Some people use this passage to justify their opinion that secular things cannot or should not happen in a sacred building...

But Jesus was speaking of the temple of his body (John 2:21). The religious people of that day did not get that. They didn't understand they had never heard anyone speak like this...

They were just going about their normal everyday lives... It was, for them, business as usual, they were running on auto pilot that day. But Jesus came to the temple. Animals were being bought and sold. Coins were being changed. All the usual people had all their usual places and usual roles.

This is one of those stories that we need to put to one side a couple of things, things that distract, in order that we can really see and understand what is going on. I don't think this story is simply about Jesus getting angry. Yes, Jesus got angry, but he never sinned...Jesus' anger was righteous anger. It's ok to get angry, however we need to be careful not to sin. But there's more to this story than that. And I don't think it's about the animals or the moneychangers being in the temple. Jesus surely knew they would be there. He grew up as a faithful Jew going to the temple. He didn't show up this day and say, "Wow! Now there's a surprise... there are animals and moneychangers here. I didn't know they'd be here...this is wrong." The animals and moneychangers had always been there. That's how the system worked. It was normal for them to be there.

I think Jesus went to the temple that day for one purpose; to throw out and overturn, to challenge the idea of normality or of running on auto pilot. There are times when we need the tables of our life overturned and the animals thrown out. It's just so easy to fall into the trap of normality.

Have we ever run on autopilot... we arrive but we're not really there. That's 'normality'. Have we ever smiled that I'm-good-and-everything-is-fine smile but behind the smile there's emptiness, we feel hollow, and our heart's breaking? Surely that's carrying on with normality, putting a brave face on... Or maybe we wake up in the morning and we are just as tired as we were when we went to bed the night before. Sometimes we can look at the issues and concerns but we're stuck on auto pilot or on the treadmill of life. We're busy but not really getting anywhere. There's no depth or meaning, only business as usual. Running on auto pilot can happen anywhere: in friendships, marriages, parenting, work, church.

The 'things' are not, however, the problem. They are the symptom in the same way that the animals and moneychangers in the temple were not the problem. They are the symptoms of something deeper going on. The problem is not so much in the temple as it is in the heart. That deeper issue is, I think, what is it that gives rise 'normality' or 'auto pilot'. Sometimes it's about our fear. We're fearful about what is happening in our life or the uncertainty of the future and we want some type of security and predictability so we can keep on doing the same old things. Being on auto pilot is predictable and steady but it creates only the illusion of security. Sometimes 'auto pilot' is a symptom of our grief and sorrow. Something has been lost. We can't get back the life we want so we switch or cling to auto pilot because it's familiar and we want some stability. Other times we are so busy and worn out making a living that life turns into one task after another, one appointment after another, a never ending to do list, and on auto pilot. Maybe we've taken people, relationships, and things for granted. Maybe we've lost our sense of gratitude, wonder, or mystery. I do not say any of that as a criticism or judgment of you, me, or anyone else. I'm just saying what often happens to us. What has running on auto pilot looked like in my life, in your life? There are thousands of reasons and ways in which we fall into the trap of running on auto pilot. When we run on auto pilot we can forget. We forget that we really are the temple of God's presence. We forget that all of creation is the residence of God. We forget that in whatever direction we might turn, there is the face of God gazing upon us. And

as soon as we forget those things about ourselves, each other, or the world, life becomes running on auto pilot. Life becomes boringly normal!

I think that's what happened in the temple. They didn't see themselves or one another as the true temple of God. It was all about the human-built temple, the animals, and the coins. They had forgotten that God was more interested in them than in their festivals and that God wanted them more than their offerings.

When we forget that we are the temple of God life can easily become a series of transactions. Relationships and intimacy are lost. Priorities get rearranged. Making a living replaces living a life. Life becomes a marketplace rather than a place for meeting the holy in ourselves and one another. And it's running on auto pilot.

That's what Jesus is overturning and driving out of the temple. In the gospel according to St. John this happens at the very beginning of Jesus ministry. The Word became flesh (John 1:14), water became wine (John 2:9), and now the temple is becoming human. And it does not stop here. Throughout the rest of the gospel Jesus will be interrupting our running on auto pilot, our normality. Think of the Samaritan woman at the well or about the paralysed man who spent thirty-eight years on a mat (John 5:1-9)?

And then there's Lazarus (John II:I-44). He's been dead three days already. Martha knows the smell of death is present. Jesus challenges the normality of life and death... "Take away the stone," he says. Death will not have the final word. "Lazarus, come out." And let's not forget the five thousand plus people who are empty and hungry (John 6:I-I3). Philip is sure there's not enough. There's no way to feed them. Empty and hungry people... this is normality... But Jesus has other plans. Two fish and five loaves are more than enough. Everyone was satisfied and twelve baskets were filled with leftovers. Over and over again Jesus is interrupting, disrupting, overturning, and throwing out the running on auto pilot, the normality of life. Living life on auto pilot or in the normal or mundane destroys our ability to see and participate in the holy that is already present in and among us. The Word became flesh so that the temple might become human. lesus continues to overturn and throw out complacency because the

truth is there are still Samaritan women waiting at the well in our world today. There are still lame people, there are still empty and hungry people, there are still people held captive to sin and they waiting to be made alive, to hear the good news.

Maybe for you today this isn't about other people. Maybe you are the women at the well. Maybe you are empty and hungry today. Maybe you need to be called to life. Maybe the normality of life needs to be interrupted today.

Regardless of who we are, what we've done or left undone, or how we see or judge our life, we are the temple of God and there is one who stands in the temple of our life interrupting boringly predictable.. So...what does the temple of our life need today? What animals need to be driven out? What tables in our life need to be overturned? Let's say no to the boring predictable life... let's remember our body is the temple of the Holy Spirit...

#### **Affirmation of faith**

Let us affirm our faith in Jesus Christ the Son of God. Though he was divine, he did not cling to equality with God, but made himself nothing. Taking the form of a slave, he was born in human likeness. He humbled himself and was obedient to death. even the death of the cross. Therefore God has raised him on high, and given him the name above every name: that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, and every voice proclaim that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father. Amen. cf Philippians 2.6-11
