Luke 15:1-10

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

The Parable of the Lost Sheep

15 Now all the tax collectors and sinners were coming near to listen to him. ² And the Pharisees and the scribes were grumbling and saying, "This fellow welcomes sinners and eats with them."

³ So he told them this parable: ⁴ "Which one of you, having a hundred sheep and losing one of them, does not leave the ninety-nine in the wilderness and go after the one that is lost until he finds it? ⁵ And when he has found it, he lays it on his shoulders and rejoices. ⁶ And when he comes home, he calls together his friends and neighbours, saying to them, 'Rejoice with me, for I have found my lost sheep.' ⁷ Just so, I tell

you, there will be more joy in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous persons who need no repentance.

The Parable of the Lost Coin

⁸ "Or what woman having ten silver coins, if she loses one of them, does not light a lamp, sweep the house, and search carefully until she finds it?
⁹ And when she has found it, she calls together her friends and neighbours, saying, 'Rejoice with me, for I have found the coin that I had lost.' ¹⁰ Just so, I tell you, there is joy in the presence of the angels of God over one sinner who repents."

Sermon by Rev Claire Robertson

Today's gospel reading about the lost sheep and the lost coin is written by Luke, the physician and friend of St Paul. St Luke is known for his compassion for those who were on the edges of society. In his gospel, it is those who are the "sinners" and outcasts who listen to Jesus. The religious establishment, in contrast, is made up of those who are continually criticizing him.

In the time of Jesus there were a number of different Jewish groups. The two most mentioned in the gospels are the Pharisees, who were interested in maintaining the religious traditions of their faith, and the Sadducees whose members were mainly aristocrats who wanted power in the political arena.

On this occasion it is the Pharisees and teachers of the law who are finding fault with Jesus for eating with tax collectors and sinners. The Pharisees felt it was their role to ensure that the Jewish Law was kept. This meant ensuring that the Ten Commandments given to the Jewish nation on Mount Sinai were observed, along with over 600 additional regulations that had become part of their tradition since then.

Many of these regulations were to do with what one ate, how it was prepared and with whom one ate. The Pharisees were very concerned with purity laws. They did not want their fellow Jews to eat contaminated food and they did not want them to mix with the wrong sort of people.

Tax collectors were definitely the wrong sort of people. They were Jews who worked on behalf of the Roman occupying power to collect taxes from their own Jewish countrymen to give to the Romans. Their job involved socializing with non - Jews or Gentiles, who in the eyes of the Pharisees, would be seen as "sinners". To enter the house of a Gentile, let alone eat with them made a Jew "unclean".

When the Pharisees and Teachers of the Law saw Jesus meeting and eating with these people they were scandalised. This was not how a Jewish rabbi was supposed to behave. So Jesus tells them a parable in which he playfully casts them as shepherds who had 100 sheep and had lost one. The job of a shepherd in Jesus' time was dirty and dangerous – not a job that one would associate with the immaculately dressed Pharisees who were very conscious of their status and dignity.

Jesus is trying to teach the Pharisees to take themselves a little less seriously. He is modelling for them how they should be looking after the people in their care – by seeking out and welcoming those who are lost because every single person is precious to God. At the same time he is addressing those who are on the margins of society and reminding them that God cares for each one of them.

The Pharisees get a bad press in Luke's gospel, but we do know from John's gospel that some of them were keen to listen to Jesus – Nicodemus, who in chapter 3 meets Jesus secretly at night, and Joseph of Arimathea, who after the crucifixion asks Pilate for Jesus' body and lovingly lays it in his own tomb. We are told in John 19:38 that Joseph was a disciple of Jesus, but a secret one because of his fear of the Jewish leaders.

How many other Pharisees, I wonder, were secret disciples of Jesus, but by failing to speak up for Jesus and his message of compassion, truth and peace, when the criticism started, allowed their leaders to stray so completely off the right path that they handed Jesus over to the Roman occupying power to be crucified. Their leaders had become lost sheep rather than shepherds!

Do we feel we can speak to our leaders and peers when we see injustice done or are we too frightened like Nicodemus and Joseph?

Jesus set out his manifesto in Luke 4.18-19, to bring good news to the poor, to proclaim release to captives and to let the oppressed go free. What is Jesus asking us to do to make our world a better place? In John's Gospel, Chapter 10, Jesus refers to himself as the Good Shepherd who will lay down his life for his sheep. His sheep recognise his voice and he calls them by name.

Jesus calls each one of us by name but in order to respond we need to practise listening to him so we recognise his voice.

As a musician I've had lots of music teachers who have shown me different ways to listen.

When I was 11 I had an amazing teacher called Jean Merlow. She was about five feet tall, very extrovert and smoked cigars! Her catch phrase was "If I had to give a lesson in one word that word would be listen".

Over the years she taught me how to listen better in many different ways—one way was to realise that the space or silence between notes, which musicians call rests, is as important as the notes themselves.

To demonstrate this I am going to sing two phrases from the score of Pirates of the Caribbean. Because I think they could definitely be thought of as lost sheep!

So with rests the melody sounds like this (sung phrase on audio recording)

And without rests: (sung phrase without rests)

You can hear that without enough silence the music loses its distinctiveness and it is very difficult to recognise. I have found that if I don't find time for silent prayer in the day recognising Jesus' voice in my life becomes much more difficult.

If we stop listening to Jesus we all become like lost sheep. But when we hear and respond to his voice he calls us all to be shepherds and to go out to find lost sheep. We know this because St Peter calls the church a royal priesthood. Everyone, through their baptism, shares in the collective priesthood of the church. Therefore each one of you is commissioned as a shepherd by Jesus to look for lost sheep.

But in order to know which lost sheep Jesus wants us to find we need to listen to his voice. Amen
