2 Peter 1:16-end

¹⁶ For we did not follow cleverly devised myths when we made known to you the power and coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, but we had been eyewitnesses of his majesty. ¹⁷ For he received honour and glory from God the Father when that voice was conveyed to him by the Majestic Glory, saying, ‘This is my Son, my Beloved, with whom I am well pleased.’ ¹⁸ We ourselves heard this voice come from heaven, while we were with him on the holy mountain.

¹⁹ So we have the prophetic message more fully confirmed. Glory to you, O Lord.


17 Six days later, Jesus took with him Peter and James and his brother John and led them up a high mountain, by themselves. ² And he was transfigured before them, and his face shone like the sun, and his clothes became dazzling white. ³ Suddenly there appeared to them Moses and Elijah, talking with him. ⁴ Then Peter said to Jesus, ‘Lord, it is good for us to be here; if you wish, I will make three dwellings here, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah.’ ⁵ While he was still speaking, suddenly a bright cloud overshadowed them, and from the cloud a voice said, ‘This is my Son, the Beloved; with him I am well pleased; listen to him!’ ⁶ When the disciples heard this, they fell to the ground and were overcome by fear. ⁷ But Jesus came and touched them, saying, ‘Get up and do not be afraid.’ ⁸ And when they looked up, they saw no one except Jesus himself alone. ⁹ As they were coming down the mountain, Jesus ordered them, ‘Tell no one about the vision until after the Son of Man has been raised from the dead.’

Reflection by Rev Barnabas Leeke

Who is Jesus to you? This is a really important question because the Christian faith is entirely based on the personhood of Jesus, i.e. Christ. There has been much debate over the intervening centuries about where Jesus sits on the Human-Divine axis, some of it quite fiercely, and sadly sometimes violently, contested. The conclusion that theologians much wiser than me have come to is that Jesus is both fully human and fully divine, if you can try and wrap your mind around that! Some might consider it something of a cop out, but it is probably the best that our human perspective can come up with and I am not going to try and elaborate on it here.

I think that the Jesus whom most of us have experienced in one way or another, or who are trying to follow as best we can, or who we believe in without a completely rational way of explaining it, is even more complex than that false dichotomy of the human-divine axis. Perhaps we should be considering the problem more as a radar chart, sometimes called a spider chart, which can plot values on multiple axes to compare multivariate data sets (I've included one here as an example). The question then might become, "What shape is Jesus to you?"!



As we come to the end of the Epiphany season and prepare for the start of Lent on Wednesday, it is precisely this question that we are dealing with in our readings for today. Epiphany has been a time of exploration of Jesus' life and ministry; we've seen kings and rulers challenged by his

birth, contemporary prophets identifying him as the messiah, simple fishermen called into a life of faith and witness, and been commanded ourselves to seek after the same kingdom that Jesus was bringing to fruition. Today we get the answer to the question, and not once but twice. We have the eyewitness testimony of Peter, recorded in all the synoptic gospels (Mt 17, Mk 9, Lk 9) but today taken from Matthew's gospel, of Jesus being transfigured before Peter, James and John. Jesus, for once and once only, displaying his true nature in the shining blaze of God's glory.

There is just so much to unpack here that it is worth spending a little time looking at the symbolism of the moment. He takes his absolute inner circle of disciples, Peter whom he has already renamed as the rock on which the church of Christ will be built, and James and John who were some of the first disciples to join him (and may have been related to him through Mary). They go up a mountain, bringing to mind Moses receiving the commandments from God at Sinai and Elijah seeing God pass by in the silence at Horeb (incidentally two names for the same mountain). If that wasn't clear enough, these two also rock up to testify to Jesus as fulfilling both the Law (given to Moses) and the prophets (epitomised in Elijah as the great prophet). A cloud descends, as so often in the Old Testament where God's presence is indicated by a cloud, such as leading the people through the desert and residing in the tabernacle. And Jesus' divinity is made evident by his face and clothes becoming blindingly white as God's glory is revealed, a glory we have heard all through the OT cannot be viewed directly due to its extreme potency. Finally the crashing, thunderous, all pervading voice of God spells it out directly, "This is my Son, the Beloved; with him I am well pleased, listen to him!"

This event is so important that the church celebrates it twice a year. The Feast of the Transfiguration is on the 6th August each year, and almost precisely six months in between we are reminded of it again before the start of Lent. Why is that? I can't think of any other aspect of Jesus' life which we celebrate twice (let me know if you can!). It is because it tells us something really important about who Jesus is, or rather a few really

important things about who Jesus is. He is completely divine, able to inhabit and display the undiluted glory of the Godhead. He is the beloved Son of God, to be listened to and obeyed, the heir of the kingdom as we heard last week. He is the fulfilment of all the law and the prophets, the turning point of human history from prophecy to completion. This is awesome, awe-inspiring stuff! This is why we worship and follow Jesus, but as I said earlier this is also not the whole story.

On your radar chart you should have Jesus' divinity at 100%, that is the message of these passages, Peter is at pains to say it is not a myth and that he saw it with his own eyes. We also have the eyewitness testimony that Jesus was a real person, who lived on earth and ate and drank like any other human being, so you should also have his humanity at 100%. But I hope that, like me, you also have other axes on this radar chart, axes which speak of your own personal experience of Jesus. These are more difficult to define and may include aspects of the Son which are mediated by the other persons of the Trinity – Father and Spirit. Perhaps you have felt the presence of Jesus as a friend in times of loneliness or difficulty. Perhaps you have known Jesus as a teacher and an example as you have tried to live the moral life in a challenging world. Perhaps you have known Jesus as the shepherd or pastor, providing for your needs whether they be physical, emotional or spiritual. Perhaps you have known Jesus as a guiding light in your life when the path has been unclear and you didn't know which way to turn. No doubt there are other aspects of Jesus that have been important to you in understanding God's will for your life and the life of the whole world. This is the Jesus that we worship and adore, a living, active person transforming lives and speaking truth and light into dark places.

As we approach Lent, a time of prayer and reflection in preparation for the celebration of Jesus' supreme act of redemption and transformation at Easter, I encourage you to take some time out to complete your radar chart (literally or metaphorically) and discover the shape of Jesus in your life. This isn't just an academic exercise to sort out some knotty theology. The most powerful and effective means of sharing our faith is through sharing our personal encounters with Jesus. It is by describing to

others what the shape of Jesus is for us, that we are able to help them find the shape of Jesus that fits the hole in their lives. For Peter, James and John the encounter on the mountain top was really important to help them understand who Jesus is, and it is a part of our witness too, but each of us has experiences which are just as important in sharing who Jesus is today. It's not always simple or straightforward, but we can begin by telling our story, our shape, and prayerfully leave the rest to God. Because even now, as when Peter wrote in his letter, "men and women moved by the Holy Spirit [speak] from God."

God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, thank you for the witness of faithful people who have led us to believe. Thank you for the way that you have been present and active in our lives, in just the shape that we have needed. Help us to share our experience of you so that we all may come to the vision of your unclouded glory. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen.
